





RECTOR'S REPORT



When St. Paul writes to his churches, he prays and hopes that they are communities marked by faith, hope, and love. The circumstances don't have to be favorable, but he wants to see people being shepherded by the Spirit, and growing in their faith, hope, and love.

When we started 2021, we resolved to be a community that would seek to grow in faith, hope, and love while being faithful to the proclamation of God's plan of rescue and redemption. Regardless of the circumstances, we wanted to be found busy doing the work of the kingdom and carrying forward the good news of reconciliation. It was important to hold the line, because many other churches had not been able to. Forty-five hundred churches closed in 2019 alone. David Kinnaman, head of the Barna Group, predicts that up to 20 percent of churches could close within the next 18 months. Barna also notes that 38 percent of Pastors have considered leaving the ministry in the past year. Since the pandemic began, Church attendance has fallen by as much as 33 percent.

In the midst of these trends, in the midst of pandemic, in the midst of uncertain times, I give thanks for how God has supported and upheld our community. Despite variants and the changes we've had to make, we have been busy for the sake of the Gospel. We have baptized, confirmed, and received new members. We have studied the spiritual disciplines, studied the scriptures, and rejoined our friends at St. Paul's Reformed Episcopal Church. We have renewed wedding vows, blessed animals, and relaunched our children's ministry. We were able to continue distributing food with a new partnership with the Whitesville Rural Volunteer Fire Department. We hosted missionaries and have continued to support them in their ministries. We even sent a beloved member off to his heavenly home with celebration for a race well run.

And all of this could not have happened without the Holy Spirit. In the words of Psalm 124, If the Lord had not been on our side... the flood would have engulfed us, the torrent would have swept over us, the raging waters would have swept us away. Thanks be to God for his provision, his protection, and faithfulness to St. Timothy's.

In the last year, God showed up and gave us what we needed. He was there for us. And the miracle is that I saw faith, hope, and love growing in our midst.

In the year to come, I pray we will continue to call out to the Lord. I pray we will continue to grow in Faith, Hope, and Love while continuing to participate in God's plan for rescue and redemption. I pray that we rise up and fill the gap and rise to the opportunities of our age. That St. Timothy's would be a refuge to the lonely, a shield to the shamed, and a light burning in the darkness.

I don't know what normal looks like in the context of ministry. I haven't had a normal year yet! But I pray that, in this time, we will be a church of *Now*. *Now* is the day, now is the time. The fields are ripe for the harvest. Let us lean forward and run a good race, to the end that all will see their Savior face to face and be reconciled.

DEACON'S REPORT

A parishioner once asked me: why do you wear your stole differently from a Bishop or Priest? The easy answer: it is a sign of my office and order, and it means I am Ordained into the Order of Deacons.

Reflection after the question made me realize many may not understand the role of a Deacon, one of the three ordained orders of clergy within the Anglican Church of North America. By this report, I hope to clarify what Deacons do and help you understand my specific ministry both at St. Timothy's and in the community.

As a Deacon, I am easy to spot in church because I wear my stole on a diagonal from my left shoulder to my right hip. This is to symbolize my hands are free to serve, for that is my Deacon role: to serve.

The role of the deacon was established early in the Christian Church when it became apparent that there was a need for a ministry that focused on caring for the poor, the sick, the marginalized, and the lonely (Acts 6:2-4). Although a deacon's role has evolved and changed over time, caring for those in need and often outside the church has remained.

Representing Christ the Servant, Deacons are charged by their Bishop "... to interpret



to the Church the needs, concerns and hopes of the world." Like other Deacons, I am a link between the church and the world by working for our Bishop and serving as the Chaplain for Whitesville Fire and Rescue.

At St. Timothy's, I serve the Priest during worship service by reading the Gospel, leading prayer, bidding to confession, laying the table (altar), aiding in administering Communion (or, when called, to carry it to those kept from the table), and giving the dismissal to send the congregation back into the world. As a Fire Department Chaplain, I minister to a "congregation" of 114 firefighters and paramedics as well as their families along with other First Responders when called. At all times, I provide a Ministry of Presence representing Christ the Servant providing light for those who too often see only darkness and despair. As your Deacon, I end this report with this from the Gospel of St. Matthew 5:16:

. . . let light shine before others . . . and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

LAY CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

I was commissioned as a Lay Chaplain ten years ago at St. Paul's in Summerville, SC.

When I looked at my report from last year, I realized that some of my involvement is still being impacted by the COVID pandemic. Due to medical reasons, not all of our members are able to return to church yet.

I am still attending staff meetings via ZOOM as well as various other meetings. I still visit the homebound but honor the safety precautions. I also lead the Reader/ Lay Eucharistic Minister/Lay Eucharistic Visitor Ministries.

It is a blessing to be a part of the Pastoral Care Ministry and to assist in making sure prayer requests get to the prayer team in a timely manner. We have an awesome prayer team, which has been in place for many years and now has fifteen very dedicated prayer warriors. We also have an Intercessory Prayer team which is available to pray for people during our weekly church services. We have been blessed to feel God's presence time and time again in response to our prayers.

Rita Conley-Pitts & Anne Smyth oversee our Card Ministry and Anne Smyth oversees our Grief Booklet Ministry. They send cards to members for many different occasions; get well, birth of a child, surgery, encouragement, sympathy, and sometimes just to stay in touch with those who are homebound. The Grief Booklets are sent to those who have lost a loved one.

My time as a Lay Chaplain has truly been a blessing. I am especially grateful for the people that make up our Church family at St. Timothy's. While we are no longer a "church plant" we are still learning as we grow and having fun working in God's soil. Laurie Rice Lay Chaplain

This self-starting group of singers was born this year and has added a new spark to the musical presentation. A hearty thank you goes out to all of those folks that made this happen.




ST. JAMES ANGLICAN CHURCH MARERA, KENYA

SOCIETY OF ANGLICAN MISSIONARIES AND SENDERS (SAMS)




St. Timothy's was honored this year by a visit from The Reverend Roger Griffin on September 4, 2021. Roger+, along with

For now, they are able to present foundational material to all the children, regardless of age. It is our hope that, as this program continues to grow, we'll be able to break into two classes on a permanent basis. Until then, the older children actually get to help teach the lessons to the younger children. Teaching is one of the fastest ways of retaining material, and we're proud to see how much our children are learning. 

and we know God works all things to His purpose!


