Reports

Vicar

It is with gratitude for all that the Lord has done in my life, especially as it relates to being able to serve for a third year at St. Timothy's church, that I write this brief reflection on 2018.

The first thing I am struck by as I reflect on 2018 is that we certainly continued, as our vision states, to gather, celebrate, and give. Those three words sum up our life together at St. Timothy's.

2018 was a year of many "firsts" for St. Timothy's. We moved into new space on the Cane Bay Parkway, which is where the original leadership imagined and prayed, we would be back in 2013. We began in earnest, a regular, weekly children's education time during our Saturday worship. This start was thanks to the generosity of our church family and the leadership of three members: Naomi Lattin, Vanessa Oldland, and Alexis Rehbaum. We had our first Mission Saturday and we were able to support St. Johns in their pursuit of planting a church, St. Aidan's. Finally, and for the first time we topped \$200,000.00 in financial support. The noteworthy part of that is that it happened without monthly Diocese support.

We also continued many of our previous year's efforts. Some of those highlights include; The Blessing of the Animals at North Charleston Coliseum under the direction of Anna Thompson. Darlene Kidd continued to lead the growing women's ministry and Frank Freeman has been organizing our men and twice we took our breakfast show on the road!



Outside our parish we continued to support the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy. Our monthly food distribution with St. Paul's Reformed Episcopal (RE) Church grew under the leadership of Chris Wingard and others. Since becoming USDA certified in 2017, we have grown and expanded our offering to the community. We continued our three-year

tradition of hosting a joint Angel Tree with St. Paul's REC that increased to over 30 children.

Evangelism began to happen naturally in our church as a couple members hosted fellowship 'mixers' in the Del Webb community of Cane Bay. We also had guests join our young adult trivia nights. These nights were times of loud fun, fellowship and meals, thanks to Christine Wingard, the Framptons, the Rehbaums and the Lattins, these gatherings really gained popularity.

The Vestry and finance committee courageously approved another faith budget for our life together in 2019. The church has grown to a place of self-supporting sustainability thanks be to God and His generous people. We hope to add another paid full-time person to our staff by years end. One of the proudest areas of our budget is the fact that we now provide for three missionary couples. They live in Africa, Mexico and Belize. God is using our church to grow the church around the world.

Finally, we continue to be a group that does life together in every way imaginable. Our prayer ministry is strong, our relationship with St. Paul's REC grows deeper each month and we are looking forward to realizing the plans God has for us in 2019.

Our Pastoral Care Ministry has grown in leaps and bounds. We have an awesome prayer team, which has been in place for several years now and has grown from 10 to 17 members. We have been blessed to see God's presence time and time again in response to our prayers.

I passed on the Altar Guild hat two years ago and am happy to report that the Altar Guild has doubled in size from three to six very dedicated people!

Our Card Ministry is going strong and has gotten numerous "Thank You" responses from the recipients. This past year they sent out 44 cards and 12 grief booklets. They send cards to members for many different occasions; get well, birth of a child, surgery, encouragement, sympathy, and sometimes just to stay in touch with those who are homebound.

We also have Transportation, Handyman, and Meal Ministries, which provide rides, perform minor "fixer-upper" tasks, and meals respectively, to those who have a need.

My time as a Lay Chaplain has truly been a blessing. I am especially grateful for the people that make up our Church family at St. Timothy's. Yes, we are still planting and what fun we are having working in God's soil.

ministry to The Chief Shepherd. For our Vicar to be able to discharge his tasks with joy and enthusiasm, our help – taking stuff off his plate – enabled him to focus as he should on the Spiritual and not the secular which is the calling of the Vestry.

- Model Sacrificial Giving: One must never think that God’s blessings are rewards for one’s labors, as something to which one is entitled. Reserving a portion (a tenth) in praise to the Lord demonstrates this awareness. It also weighs heavily against the selfishness we humans are naturally prone to.

In his great Pastoral Elegy, *Lycidas*, John Milton wrote: “The hungry sheep look up and are not fed.” Such is still the case in the broken world in which we live today and within our community – many are hungry for living water and the bread of life. By following the above goals, St. Timothy’s Vestry led within the parish and focused on “Feed my sheep” (John 12:17) both within our walls and across the threshold into our community.

We saw growth in many ministries: Adult Discipleship increased via growing Men’s and Women’s fellowships; Worship expanded for children and adults after a mid-year move to new and larger space at the Church at Cane Bay; Evangelism Ministries grew via Godly Play for children and increased participation of laity in worship and interest in Cursillo; Support for First Responders was given through aid for the Coastal Crisis Chaplaincy; Small Groups formed for breaking bread together after services and for spreading the Good News at Trivia Nights and other parish activities outside the church.

We continued strong ties with our Sister Church, St. Paul’s RE through joint worship services, Wednesday Bible Studies and through monthly food distribution to families in need.

Compassion Ministry strengthened through Christian Healing Ministries Healing Prayer training and making Intercessory Prayer Teams readily available for people attending worship services.

In addition to strong and growing Local Ministries, St. Timothy's continues to support Foreign Missions via the Kisumu, Kenya Water Mission and aid to St. James Anglican Church in Marera, Kenya.

During 2018, St. Timothy's began supporting a new effort, the Matthew 25: Ministries. Our collection of donated empty pill bottles is sent to Matthew 25: Ministries for inclusion in shipments of medical supplies and for shredding and recycling. St. Timothy's participation in this simple program fulfills the dual needs of improving medical care in developing countries and caring for our environment.

For our growing parish all these ministries are not choices to make... one instead of the other... they are acts of stewardship as St. Timothy's grows. As a body of Christ, we who worship at St. Timothy's of Cane Bay are embracing a biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets; our ministries and missions are connecting everything we do with what God is doing in the world.

It was my honor and privilege to serve as Senior Warden for St. Timothy's of Cane Bay during 2018. I pray that The Holy Spirit will continue to fill the hearts of the St. Timothy's faithful and enkindle in us the fire of his love. I pray our forecast will always be: "Strong Winds Ahead"!

Missions, Ministries, and Outreach/Inreach

In John 21, Jesus asks Peter three times if he loves Him. Each time Peter assures him that he does love Him, Jesus tells him to, “Feed my sheep.” Each week, we come together in worship and proclaim our love of our Lord, but this would be hollow if we weren’t feeding his sheep. While St. Timothy’s does have a food program that literally feeds those who need a helping hand, feeding His sheep is about more than food. It’s about being generous in meeting all sorts of needs. St. Timothy’s does this through missions, ministries, and outreach/inreach. It’s how we show our love to Jesus, and from the love He engenders in us, show our love to others.

Missions - Foreign

This year, St. Timothy’s continued its partnership with St. James Anglican Church, Marera (Kisumu), and were led to provide support to two new foreign missionaries endeavors: Caye to Life that is starting missionary efforts in Belize and the Society of Anglican Missionaries and Senders (SAMS) in Mexico.

St. James, Marera, Kenya

The year 2018 was a year of transitions for St. James Marera and the Diocese of Maseno South in terms of Pastoral leadership. The diocese went through the process of electing a new Bishop after the end of 24 years of service by the previous Bishop. By God’s grace The Rt. Rev. Charles Ochieng’ Ong’injo was elected the fourth Bishop of the Diocese. This was significant for St. James because Bishop Charles had previously served as the Archdeacon for Maseno Archdeaconry and as such had supervisory oversight over St. James. Both Rev. Gary Beson and Nick Rehbaum met and ministered alongside Bishop Charles during their visit in 2016. Bishop Charles is a godly man and we look forward to the transformation of our diocese under his wise pastoral leadership.

At the same time, I was asked by the Bishop to oversee another parish 30-minute drive away from Marera village. The Vicar of this large parish had just passed on after a long battle with throat cancer and they needed somebody who would serve them in the interim. What started off as a temporary arrangement ended up being permanent. So, for the most part of 2018, I was shuttling in between two parishes 30 minutes apart from each other, doing between 5-6 services every week in addition to pastoral care visits and meetings. It has been very difficult but God's grace has been sufficient in my weakness. Fortunately, the Bishop has assigned an assistant to St. James, with effect from January 12, 2019, and I no longer have to be there every day of the week. My role is now more supervisory while the new assistant takes care of the day to day pastoral duties at St. James.

We are grateful for the friendship and financial support we received in 2018 from St. Timothy's and St. Paul's CLC. The funds we received from St. Timothy have gone into the partial construction of our third classroom and at the beginning of the new school year this month we will have our new first grade class! The funds from St. Paul's CLC went into paying part of the teachers' salaries and providing meals for the children at St. James school. We hope that the help that has graciously been given by our partners will continue to enable us to realize our dream for the children of Marera village as well as the entire community.

The Ligega Community water project is yet to take off but the community's hopes are still up. I am still waiting to hear back from ARDF regarding our appeals for funds towards the water project. In an earlier meeting with ARDF's Executive Director, he indicated that he could talk to the board to approve a request of up to \$10,000. But he also highlighted that it could take up to 2 years subject to availability of funds. I have also been in touch with the local Water Missions office in Kenya and we talked about the possibility of doing the project in phases. That means that we can use the funds raised so far to do the first part of the project as we await funds for gradually completing the whole project.

We bless the Lord for the friendship we enjoyed with St. Timothy and I look forward to being a part of what He will continue to do through this friendship. Keep me in prayer as I continue my Doctor of Ministry studies at Trinity School

Caye to Life Ministries: Belize Mission

In the morning on December 16, 2018 we sailed away from our comfort zone at St. Johns Yacht Harbor and began our journey toward Belize. With many of the marina staff, tenants, and TJ's family around us in prayer, we took our biggest leap of faith yet and released the lines on Johns Island for good. Over the next eight days we sailed 700 nautical miles to Long Key, Florida with two overnight stops for weather; once in Saint Simons Island, GA after a rough passage overnight offshore of South Carolina, and the other in Fort Pierce, FL to avoid hazardous weather for two nights. God guided us along the way with a hedge of protection around us, as we were caught in gale-force winds near Cape Canaveral ahead of the storm front we were seeking to avoid. Now that we have arrived in our new marina for the next two months, we can focus on the last few projects that need to be done before we leave the United States: installing solar panels, replacing some worn rigging, and fixing a few hatches that leak in rough seas.

We have collected a box filled with travel-size hygiene items to take to Cuba when we sail across in March (Lord willing), and are preparing the necessary paperwork to enter Belize with two dogs and most of the physical possessions we own. Lane began Phase I of the three-phase process to become a Certified Biblical Counselor on January 14, 2019 through the Association of Certified Biblical Counselors (ACBC). Lane received her Master of Social Work degree in 2013 and we believe God is preparing Lane to use the two in tandem in Belize. The first phase will lay the foundation for approaching counseling armed with Biblical truths, followed by the reading & observation phase, and finally the supervision & certification phase. We are still praying for The Lord to prepare the hearts & minds of those we will encounter, as well as our hearts and minds for missional ministry overseas.

Ministries

Ministries are one of the vital ways we do God's work, both inside and outside of the church. The Holy Spirit has endowed us with gifts and using these gifts in His service is how we and His church flourish. A few of St. Timothy's ministry leaders have contributed to this report and other ministries and their leaders are listed after these contributions.

Children's Ministry – Ages 0-4

Raising kids is hard. I was warned. Weren't we all? We try our best to accomplish Deuteronomy 11:19, which encourages us to teach God's Word to our children on all occasions and in all settings. But how? How do we do it in a day and age where life is

constantly fast forwarded and there are so many other things we are "supposed" to be doing to ensure that we raise human beings that are decent members of our society?

We remember that Christ says "my burden is light."

The 0-4-year-old Children's Ministry was born this year out of a desire to create a foundation for our littlest members and equip their families to put the Love of Christ before them as an option in a world that will seek to put a million other, lesser things in His place. We've sent home 10 resource kits that include age appropriate Bibles, a children's

catechism to help with the "whys," and CD's that set scripture to music to help "hide His word in our heart." Every month we send home a book that parents can read to their child throughout the week that helps reinforce the monthly theme. Every week we send home a parenting devotion with examples of practical teaching moments that are easy to find in the day to connect our Bible lesson with daily life.

And what would you find us doing each week? On any given Saturday night it might be hard to predict just what and where our littlest members will be heading and becoming. We have wandered the desert looking for food. We watched water pour like confetti (because it was) from a rock hit with a staff. We have been the Angel that told Mary the good news. We gathered as animals to sing to Baby Jesus in a manger. But the

underlying theme through it all is: God made you. God Loves you. Jesus wants to be your friend.

Thank you St. Timothy's family for allowing me to serve your children. Whether in arts and crafts, crazy reenacting, or song - God's word is going out to our children. My favorite encouraging story is of a mother amidst a rough moment, whose little toddler looked at her and said, "Mama, God's got it!"

Pill Bottle Ministry

Many times, the pills people receive in developing countries are wrapped in paper scraps. They have no protection from moisture or the elements. And they certainly are not safely out of the reach of small children. Those orange pill bottles we take for granted are gratefully received in many parts of the world.



One group working to change that is the Cincinnati-based Matthew 25: Ministries, an international humanitarian aid and disaster relief organization, that is accepting donations of empty plastic pill bottles.

St. Timothy's sent 25 pounds of empty pill bottles (480 bottles with caps) to Matthew 25 in 2018. Outreach and Inreach

Outreach is how we become the hands and feet of Christ in our community, such as Food Distribution and providing Christmas gifts to children. Inreach is how we show our love in Christ to each other. An example of this is St. Timothy's prayer offerings and training of prayer ministers. Some of St. Timothy's programs are both Inreach and Outreach, like GriefShare which is open to anyone, member and non-members, who are grieving the loss of a loved one.

The following gives an overview of this year's Outreach programs at St. Timothy's.

Food Distribution Program

The joint Food Distribution Ministry between St. Timothy's and St. Paul's RE churches continues to flourish. We hold our monthly food distribution on the second Saturday of every month. This is the first complete year that we have been USDA certified with the Lowcountry Foodbank and receive USDA products for our community in need. Through the generous donations from our Church members we were able to raise money to purchase a freezer. This lets us provide meat to our clients each month. Both congregations contributed certain items (cleaning products, personal products, etc.) each quarter to help our clients with these expensive items. At our November distribution, each client received a voucher from a local grocery store for a free turkey or ham and in December, each client was presented a gift card for Walmart to help them through the Advent season. We were also blessed with monthly donations of bread and pastries from the Sara Lee Bakery Outlet.



Each month, we provided several full bags of groceries along with fresh produce, eggs and meat when available. We served an average of 45 families each month through the year. We also bring several bags of groceries to the Home of Hope (the Summerville shelter for homeless men). We have had the strong support of volunteers from both churches. We always have prayer ministers available to any one that would like prayers. We open with prayer and invite all that would like to participate to join us. It is so beautiful to hear the prayers of the people in our community who pray for us as well as each

Cursillo

DeColores (A Cursillo Greeting),

Cursillo is a “short Course” in Christianity oriented toward renewal of the individual, the Church and the World. Its purpose is to help individuals in the church understand their individual callings within the church and help prepare them for their part in fulfilling the Divine Commission. Cursillo is led by lay people aided by clergy.

Central to Cursillo in the [Anglican] Diocese of SC is participation in a three day weekend which has changed little over time, although the contents has shifted from the Spanish and Catholic origins of Cursillo to take on a South Carolina and Anglican flavor.

Cursillo relies heavily on the Holy Spirit to lead all participants to fulfill their own baptismal covenant in a much deeper way. Participation in Cursillo prepares attendees for today’s ministry by helping them find inspiration and direction to lead others to Christ.

During 2018, the thirteen lay Cursillistas (people who have completed a three-day Cursillo weekend) of St. Timothy’s continued regular participation in Diocesan Cursillo events by attending both Diocesan and Regional Berkeley/Colleton/Dorchester Ultreyas (word is now used by the Cursillo community to signify the meeting which is held after a Cursillo experience). Their goal is the “glue” of Cursillo: “Make a friend, be a friend, Bring that friend to your friend Jesus”.
