



DEACON'S REPORT

In 2019, St. Timothy's was blessed by the ordination of its first Transitional Deacon and this year, by God's grace, I was ordained as St. Timothy's first Vocational or Permanent Deacon. So, what's the difference between Transitional and Permanent? And, just importantly, what is a deacon and what does one do?

All clergy within the Anglican Communion, The Anglican Church in North America, and our own Anglican Diocese of South Carolina, are one of the three historic ordained orders of the church: Bishops, Priests and Deacons. All Anglican clergy are first ordained as deacons and all complete a multi-year process during which the Church validates an individual calling and formally prepares a candidate for ordination.

A Transitional Deacon is a temporary stage for someone following a calling toward ordination as a priest while a Vocational or Permanent Deacon is someone who has been serving in ministry outside the church (a vocation) and will continue (hence permanent) in their chosen ministry after ordination. I am therefore a Permanent Deacon and my ministry is service as Chaplain for Whitesville Rural Fire and Rescue. As an Ordained Chaplain, I am a link between my "congregation" of 80

firemen and their families and my faith community of St. Timothy's.

Through my ordination as a Deacon, the Church provided me with important credentialing allowing me to serve the Church as "Christ's presence in the world". By appointment of the Bishop, I serve and assist St. Timothy's Priests in public worship reading the Gospel, bidding people to prayer and aiding in the administration of Holy Communion. I answer to the Bishop serving as his eyes and ears in the world to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns and hopes of the world — especially those in the world who fall outside the "four walls of the church" and are often on the margins of society.

The Order of Deacons is described as "the most glorious and Christ-like of all ministries". It is the order that informs all orders of the work we are all sent to do. As St. Ignatius of Antioch said, "...let the deacons be entrusted with the ministry of Jesus Christ."

As your Deacon, I end with this prayer:

Lord, help me to serve you in such a way that my life brings Your light into a dark world. Amen.

It is a blessing to be a part of the Pastoral Care Ministry headed up by Rev. David Hudspeth and to assist in making sure prayer requests get to the prayer team in a timely manner. We have an awesome prayer team, which has been in place for many years and now has 16 very dedicated prayer warriors. We have been blessed to feel God's presence time and time again in response to our prayers.

Our Altar Guild, led by Margaret Weaver, is also awesome. We are in a shared worship space, so it is quite a task to setup and teardown the altar each week. This is especially challenging during Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Baptisms, Confirmations, etc., which require special



configurations. COVID-19 has added new challenges, but the Altar Guild has not missed a beat. They have found creative ways to be sure we are all kept safe during our Communion services.

Rita Conley-Pitts and Anne Smyth handle our Card Ministry, and Anne Smyth oversees our Grief Booklet Ministry. They send cards to members for many different occasions: get well, birth of a child, surgery, encouragement, sympathy, and sometimes just to stay in touch with those who are homebound. The Grief Booklets are sent to those who have lost a loved one.

My time as a Lay Chaplain has truly been a blessing. I am especially grateful for the people that make up our Church family at St. Timothy's. While we are no longer a "church plant" we are still learning as we grow and having fun working in God's soil.

ST. JAMES ANGLICAN CHURCH MARERA, KISUMU, KENYA SCHOOL

We were looking forward to a visit from Fred+ and his wife, Sophy, in December; however, the visit was yet another COVID-19 casualty. We pray for next year!

SOCIETY OF ANGLICAN MISSIONARIES AND SENDERS (SAMS)

Roger and Joanne Griffin provide seminary-level studies and opportunities for Christian leadership formation in the Global South. They primarily serve in Mexico, but also throughout Latin America. This is a collection of excerpts from their year-end newsletter:

To kick the year off, we flew back to the states for a family medical emergency. And, returned home just in time for the COVID-19 lock-down.

VANNESSA'S LOCKER

main priority for our ministry, Our Vannessa's Locker, is to help the teachers and staff of North Charleston Elementary feel loved, appreciated and supported by the outside community especially during this challenging year. In the past, our community provided 60 backpacks filled with all the supplies a transfer student would need to start classes mid-semester. Often, these children arrive with little in the way of personal possessions; they are often moved from a troubled situation or they simply do not have the funds to pay for the required school supplies in order to get started or to catch-up. The total value of each filled backpack is \$75.00. In addition, members of St. Timothy's bought a number of uniform khaki pants, regulation polo shirts, underwear, socks, and sneakers.

In June, we provided \$1,000.00 to help several families avoid eviction until they could get their finances in order. In October, we helped students prepare for a Fall festival by providing pumpkins and haystacks which provided atmosphere for a fund-raiser.

At the time this report is being written, Vannessa's Locker just paid for the moving fees to have a piano that our member, Wynne Boone, flagged for donation as the SOS Club to which Wynne is a member.

The SOS Club, was replacing the gentlyused piano which was gratefully received by the Music Dept of North Charleston Elementary.

CHILD CARE WORKERS DURING PANDEMIC

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY & EDUCATION

Children's ministry has been one of the biggest puzzles of the last year. In many ways, gatherings of children served as the canary in the coal mine. The schools were the first things to experience wide closures.

I still remember where I was standing when they said the schools were closing. It was in part that decision that led us to the difficult decision to suspend our inperson worship services.

And, if children's gatherings were the first to go, they have been slow to return. Many that helped volunteer with the

children find themselves in vulnerable categories, and have had to take a step back from service. Additionally, many parents are anxious that their children might have a hand in spreading sickness.

During the summer, we added a family worship service - a simplified offering that parents could watch with their children. They were fun to make and we had some success. However, we realized we were asking families to add sitting in front of another screen on top of the screen time for distance learning and the screen time of being locked in with nowhere to go!

What we have done is worked to place resources in the hands of parents, so they can have the tools they need to teach their children the faith. With stories and crafts, we are encouraging parents to set the example of a family that learns and worships together. We've even provided liturgies that have been prepared specifically for families. Personally, it has been incredible to watch my son blossom and make connections in scripture. And it has been even more incredible to see how our three year old soaks up this information, too. As a part of our evening prayers we say the Lord's Prayer, and she screams it out at the top of her lungs. It's truly a sight to behold!

We are beginning to rebuild and restaff our children's programs. Families are an important part of St. Timothy's, and God is calling us to minister to families during these times. Please be in prayer as we work to move to safely bring families and children back into the life of worship at St. Timothy's.



Several from St. Timothy's elected to join them or participated with them when St. Timothy's Bible Study took a break during Advent. We prayerfully look forward to the time when we can join them again!

By February, we will have completed all eight chapters of "The Armor ...", each chapter having started with a YouTube video teaching and concluding with a series of questions to ponder.

In addition to reading, we share and discuss how to live out the Gospel message in the 21st Century. Discussing the messages delivered through fact or fiction by authors who are Christ-centered help us remember Whose we are, even when life throws us into a tailspin. Together, we strengthen our resolve to refuse the world to shape our outlook. Together we encourage each other to extend a helping hand to family, friends, and even strangers. And together, we refuse to allow COVID-19 to shape our lives as we enter 2021. Thus, we pray that God blesses our bi-weekly Zoom meetings and our discussions based on Scripture and how it impacts our daily lives.


